Regular Meeting City Hall, Marysville, Kansas-January 9, 2023

Members of the Governing Body of the City of Marysville were called to order in the regular session at 7:00 p.m. on the date and place noted above with Mayor Barnes in the chair. City Administer St. John and City Clerk Holle were also present.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, roll call was answered by the following council members: Frye, Keating, Snellings, Beikman, Goracke, Behrens, and Throm. A quorum was present. Council member Price was absent.

The minutes from the December 27th regular meeting were presented for approval. CM Throm moved; CM Snellings seconded to approve the minutes as presented. Motion carried by 7-0 voice vote.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

- 1. **CEMETERY KIOSK.** Diane Schroller, Ward 4 asked the Council when a kiosk at the Cemetery would be completed. She was told the kiosk is in the 2023 budget and the Cemetery and Parks Supervisor is working on a plan. A Cemetery Committee meeting will be arranged.
- **2. COUNTRY CLUB LAKE.** Steve Prell, 1042 Pony Express Highway presented to Council information about the Country Club Lake concerning his property.
- **3. COUNTRY CLUB LAKE.** Vallery Prell, 1042 Pony Express Highway presented to Council information about the Country Club Lake concerning her property.
- 4. **COUNTRY CLUB LAKE.** Kris Schrater, 1040 Pony Express Highway presented to Council information about Country Club Lake concerning his property.
- 5. **KOESTER MUSEUM HEATING SYSTEM.** CA St. John reported the City crews have found or rebuilt 3 radiators for the Koester House Museum. We are still looking for 1 radiator. The 3 radiators have been taken to Landoll Company to be sandblasted and then will be taken to Schroller Collision to be painted. When the radiators are finished the heating system can be turned on with some modifications for the missing radiator.

BUSINESS AND DISCUSSION ITEMS:

1. MARSHALL COUNTY SPORTS & RECREATION. Jacey Rombeck representing Marshall County Sports and Recreation presented an annual report from 2022 showing participation numbers in the various activities available. She also reported they had applied ag lime to the fields and had cut the lip off the pitching mound on Feldhausen Field and added new sod.

NOTICES AND HEARINGS:

CONSENT AGENDA. The Consent Agenda was presented for consideration. CM Throm moved; CM Keating seconded to approve the Consent Agenda. Motion carried unanimously. The Consent Agenda consisted of the following:

1. Convention & Tourism request totaling \$9,100.00 as follows: Travel Industry of Kansas, annual 2023 dues and publications \$750.00; Social Media Marketing Posts, annual \$500.00; Office Supplies & Google Drive, annual \$1,000.00; Tourism Marketing Material, annual \$1,750.00; Travel Kansas! Magazine Ad, full-page \$2,100.00 less business participation of \$1,525.00 net \$525.00; Fairytales on Ice-MCAC grant for advertising, \$3,000.00.

- 2. Cash balances in funds as of December 31, 2022, were presented as well as outstanding debt and receivable balances. Revenue/Expenditure Budget Reports through December 2022 showed unadjusted accumulated revenues in the General Fund of \$2,940,206 or 113% of budget; Water Revenue Fund, \$904,132 or 101% of budget, Sewer Revenue Fund, \$1,162,774 or 152% of budget. Unadjusted statement of expenditures in the General Fund totaled \$3,052,871 or 105% of budget, Water Revenue Fund, \$993,178 or 73% of budget, and Sewer Revenue Fund, \$973,282 or 91% of budget.
- **3.** The Municipal Judge's Report for December showed \$1,979.67 being deposited with the City Treasurer and \$211.50 being forwarded to the State Treasurer for Judicial Branch Education, court costs and law enforcement training.

APPROPRIATIONS ORDINANCE NO. 3789

- 1. Claims against the funds of the City were submitted for Council consideration as follows: General Fund, \$46,779.32; Water Revenue Fund, \$3,277.84; Sewage Revenue Fund, \$1,423.22; Swim Pool Sales Tax, \$918.28; Koester Block Maintenance, \$230.98; Transient Guest Tax, \$512.00; Sales Tax Improvements, \$11,500.00; making a total of \$64,641.64.
- **2.** An appropriations ordinance was introduced and considered to honor claims against the funds of the City as audited by the Finance Committee. CM Throm moved; CM Snellings seconded to approve the appropriations ordinance totaling \$64,641.64.
- **3.** Motion to approve the appropriations ordinance carried by 7-0 roll call vote. City Clerk Holle assigned Ordinance No. 3789.

STAFF REPORTS:

CITY ADMINISTRATOR:

- 1. FINANCIALS. CA St. John updated the Governing Body on the status of General Fund, Water Revenue Fund, Sewer Revenue Fund and Sales Tax Improvement Fund. A Capital Projects report was also included. There are some funds which are overspent due to the damage from the June storm and the insurance payments. The annual audit should begin later in January, and they address these issues.
- **2. BUDGET WORKSHOP.** CA St. John said he would like to schedule a budget workshop on February 23 at 6:00 p.m. to discuss the 2023 projects.
- **3. PUBLIC CHILDCARE MEETING.** CA St. John reminded the Council and the Public there will be an informational meeting at Landoll Lanes January 11 at 6:00 p.m. concerning a new childcare facility in Marysville.
- **4. PONY EXPRESS SQUIRREL STATUE.** CA St. John said the Pony Express Museum would like to place their new Black Squirrel statue in the entrance way to the museum. There were no objections.

STAFF REPORTS:

STREET:

1. STREET SWEEPER PURCHASE. Street Supervisor Gundelfinger included in the agenda street sweeper information for the sweepers that were demonstrated to the Street Department. The current sweeper is five years old. The quotes are as follows: Global \$283,920 less sale of sweeper \$60,000; Ravo \$275,000 and would trade-in old sweeper \$30,000; Elgin \$238,900. CM Keating moved to purchase the Global sweeper from Berry Tractor Co. for \$283,920 with the outright local sale of the current sweeper for \$60,000, CM Throm seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

PARKS & RECREATION:

1. **2 MOWER PURCHASES.** Cemetery & Parks Supervisor Cercone included in the agenda quotes to purchase 2 mowers with 48" decks to mow in the Cemetery between the stones. Prices were obtained from Exmark, \$7,439; Hustlers, \$6,832, \$6,739, \$6,906, \$7,738, \$7,999; Grasshopper, \$8,000, \$7,365; John Deere, \$8,270; Bobcat, \$8,094. CM Throm moved, CM Keating seconded to purchase 2 Hustler Fastrack side discharge mowers from Blue Valley Trailer, Waterville for \$6,739 each totaling \$13,478. Motion carried unanimously. The 1996 Dixon and the 2005 Ferris will be surplused on Purple Wave.

POLICE & FIRE:

1. 2 SUV PURCHASES. Police Chief Simpson presented bids for 2 SUVs for the Police Department. Only the Dodge Durango is available at this time. Davis Moore in Wichita quoted \$42,272.41 and Nemaha Valley Motors, Seneca quoted \$39,500.00. Upfitting from KaComm of Manhattan will cost an additional \$9,651.25 per vehicle. CM Throm moved to purchase 2 Dodge Durangos from Nemaha Valley Motors for \$39,500 each with upfitting from KaComm for \$9,621.25 each totaling \$98,382.50. CM Frye seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS:

STREET:

- 1. **POTHOLE ON N 16**TH **ST.** CM Beikman said he had several complaints about the potholes on N 16th Street near Debbie Lane. City staff said they had also received the complaints and they would repair it before the mill and overlay is completed by Hall Brothers.
- 2. **KEYSTONE ROAD.** Mayor Barnes asked if the City should remove the asphalt on Keystone Road and take it back to gravel until improvements can be made. CM Keating asked to wait to make a decision until the engineering proposals have been reviewed.

WATER & WASTEWATER:

- **1. DRAINAGE ON 7TH ST & JACKSON.** CM Throm asked if the City has a plan to improve the drainage near the Bus Barn on 7th Street and Jackson.
- **2. STORM SEWER BY NORDHUS MOTORS.** Council discussed creating a plan in 2023 to repair the storm water run off on Highway 36 near Nordhus Motors.
- **3. WATER BILL REDUCTION.** CM Snellings said the Gose boys had their water softener malfunction causing a large water bill. She asked if there was any forgiveness for these types of events. Staff told her historically only the sewer portion would be reduced if the water did not go

- down the sewer. In this case the water did go down the sewer, but they were informed they could bring the matter to the Water Committee if they chose to. They were also informed the City would make a payment plan for these large bills.
- **4. STORM SEWER TAX.** CM Throm suggested the City look at a monthly fee to fund storm water repairs in the City. Several other cities, both large and small have started this method to fund storm sewer repairs.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE:

- **1. SURVEY ON HEALTH DEPT PROPERTY.** CM Keating said the Marshall County Commissioners talked about the land survey the City is requesting before the Health Department can be built at 6th and Broadway.
- **2. GOVERNMENT DAY AT THE CAPITOL.** Mayor Barnes said he would like to go to Government Day at the Capitol on January 25th and asked if any other Council members would like to sign up.

- DOG PARK CREEK BED. CM Frye stated the creek bed at the Dog Park has lots of trees and overgrowth. He asked if the City would contract that or if the City Crews would clean it. CA St. John said that it would be contracted.
- **2. 4**TH **OF JULY FIREWORKS.** CM Keating said the VFW would like to finance a large portion of the 4th of July Fireworks celebration. He has been in contact with a company in Inman and tentatively scheduled a fireworks display for July 8. The school district agreed to allow the use of the football stadium, but neighbors would need to be contacted. The last several years the display has been at Lakeview Complex. CM Keating and a company representative will tour sights in the near future. Another local organization is interested in bringing a band here also on that day.

There being no further business, at 8:32 p.m. CM Frye moved to adjourn, CM Behrens seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

Background Information

This Update Memorandum is being provided to the City to provide an understanding of design progress for the Wastewater Lagoon and Wetland portion of the Project. There is also some information on the screening portion of the project but the primary focus of this memorandum and presentation will be on the CDBG Funded portion of the project, which is the new primary lagoon cell and the wetland development.

New Primary Lagoon Cell

It is important to note that while the area is available for the new primary cell at the proposed 18.5 ± 10^{-5} acres, the existing ground elevations would require a tremendous amount of fill material to have the new lagoon (Cell A) match the operational level of the existing Cell 1 (NW cell now). Our office has developed numerous iterations to the configuration and operational level to minimize the overall amount of earthwork required and keeping the earthwork approximately balanced between cut & fill needs. This was done to minimize costing of the overall construction of this cell.

You will note on Sheet #4 of the Preliminary Design Drawings that the existing elevations of Existing Cell #1 = 1284.5, New Cell A = 1277.5, and Existing Cells #2&3 = 1274.5. This should not modify the operations of the influent distribution box that receives all influent flow from the Main Lift Station. Nor should it adversely affect the ultimate flow patterns through the cells after construction is complete.

Interconnections Between Cells

As noted above, there will be a different operational level in the New Cell A. The connection to the influent distribution box in the northwest corner of this cell will still be

able to be completed with the original construction of that box having a future stub pipe heading east. The typical function of a primary cell will be to treat the raw wastewater as efficiently as possible to minimize the amount of solids and/or other organic material being transported to the secondary and final cells. The preliminary design indicates a control structure located in the middle of the southeast berm section of the new cell. This configuration was worked through with KDHE to provide the most reasonable amount of "travel time" between the influent and effluent.

The proposed Cell A design includes the effluent flowline from the cell to be at 1274.5, which is two feet (2') above the bottom of the new cell. This elevation also correlates with the normal operational level of Cells #2&3. But this will allow a direct connection between Cell A and existing Cell #3. We are also maintaining the current flow path from Cell #1 to Cell #3 as originally constructed and requested by KDHE during our correspondence with them on the operational conditions.

Wetlands Design Configuration

The flow from the existing final cell at the lagoon site will be transported to the wetland site through utilization of the previously abandoned forcemain that was installed when the lagoons were originally constructed. The forcemain material is PVC and/or HDPE and is adequate in size to transmit the effluent from the lagoons to the wetland site. An interconnection of the mains will occur near the existing air release manhole location west of the river. We have evaluated maximum flow rates through the lagoon discharge main and feel that this system will operate effectively even though the wetland site is much lower in elevation than the lagoon effluent cell.

Due to the size (14+ acres) of the new wetland cell, our design incorporates a subdivision of the area into three approximately equal areas to provide some consideration of flow deviation and maintenance in the future. This will require some additional structures and pipe but it will also be a better way to facilitate flow into smaller areas as required. In general, the wetlands will be operated with 6" – 18" of water in them. The internal berms that separate the sub-areas will also allow some interior pedestrian access if needed for inspection. We are also incorporating a "future" connection from Control Structure #3 on the south side of the wetland cell design if wetland expansion were to be needed in the future.

Screening & Electrical Upgrades

Our Principal Electrical Engineer has evaluated the existing electrical components of the Main Lift Station (MLS). City Staff had indicated some consideration of installation of

Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) components to improve pumping efficiency. It would also be a desire to minimize the pressure surges from pumping activities within the entire forcemain with this installation. Preliminarily it appears that this work would be feasible within the existing operations building and allowable within the KDHE-SRF program. We will have additional information on that soon regarding that portion of the design activities.

For the screening improvements we have looked at a preliminary location of the new screening channel located in the southwest corner of the existing MLS site. This location will allow both the west influent and south influent line to be rerouted and connected prior to introduction into the screening channel. Preliminary design components will provide for a main screen channel and a manual bypass channel for maintenance needs. Our office has received some preliminary information from potential screen manufacturers and will be discussing those with City Staff soon to determine what might work the best for the City in the long-term with this type of installation. The screening options may be something that we look at as a potential pre-purchase after identifying two or more "preferred" options. This may be more beneficial in the overall timing of getting the selected screen onsite for installation.

Next Steps

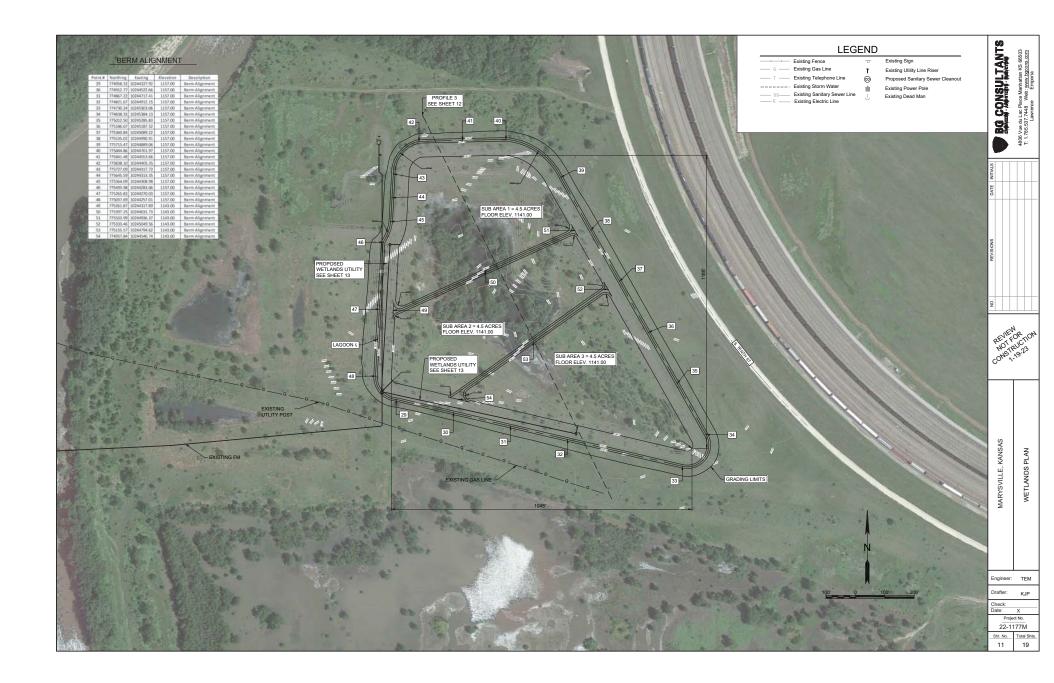
Based on consensus of the City, we will finalize and submit these drawings and bidding documents to KDHE by the end of this week. We will need to look at the timing of advertisement for the bid letting but we will coordinate with KDHE and CDBG in relation to meeting schedule requirements pertaining to the Lagoon/Wetland project since it is dual funded with each of these entities. The screening components are only funded with KDHE-SRF funds so we will coordinate a bidding process with KDHE soon after looking at screen selection for the overall bidding documents of that portion of the work.

We have been asked by the state to approve this contract so that they may put our lake on their map as a fishing lake.

In a discussion with Ely Sprenkle, Ely confirmed what had been presented before and provided me with the text below. Mr. Sprenkle also stated that he would be happy to come to one of our meetings but would prefer it to be during the day.

"The Marysville Country Club Lake has been enrolled in the Community Fisheries Assistance Program through Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks to provide angler access to the lake. It is the understanding of the local KDWP representative that approximately 100 yards of the lake shoreline is privately owned and the private property owners wish to exclude public access from this stretch of shoreline. This is an unfortunate loss to local anglers that frequent Marysville Country Club Lake. However, as by KDWP understanding of the current situation as conveyed with phone conversations from both parties, and as long as the remaining public access to the lake does not become negatively impacted by this change, then KDWP wishes to continue to have the Marysville Country Club Lake enrolled in CFAP for the foreseeable future. KDWP would suggest proper and polite signage to indicate this change to anglers that have been accustomed to accessing the entire shoreline. KDWP also requests to be provided with a map that clearly depicts property boundaries to verify what has been communicated via telephone has been properly understood by KDWP."

Mr. Sprenkle asked if we could approve the proposed agreement as soon as possible as they are assembling their public atlas to print by early February. In our conversation, Mr. Sprenkle stressed that if at any point during the agreement the state receives an excessive number of complaints from people using the lake about harassment or other problems the state will pull their contract. The state is on the side of the anglers.

- 3. On the Contracted areas the Cooperator agrees:
 - (a) that the public shall have unrestricted access to said waters for the purpose of fishing;
 - (b) That if motorized boating access is allowed by the Cooperator, it shall be limited to access points designated by the Cooperator and there will be no horsepower restrictions. Cooperator may restrict speed of boaters. Allowance of designated boat access through this Contract shall not be interpreted to require the Department to construct, install, or maintain any boating access facility;
 - (c) not to stock fish without prior written approval from the Department;
 - (d) that if the area is closed for a specific activity for more than 5 days in a calendar year, there will be a prorated payment reduction.
- 4. On the Contracted land, the Department agrees:
 - (a) to notify the public of the exact location of the said areas (s);
 - (b) to provide payment for access upon satisfactory completion of this Contract pursuant to Paragraph 2 above;
- 5. Should the legislature fail to provide sufficient funds, as determined by the Secretary of the Department, the Department may terminate the Contract. In the event of such a termination, written notice and proration provisions of Paragraph 8 shall apply.
- 6. Inadequate habitat conditions or restriction of public access to said land by the Cooperator during the Contract period may terminate, at the Department's election, all or a portion of this Contract.
- 7. Change in ownership of the Contracted land may terminate this Contract upon date of closing, provided the Cooperator advises the Department, in writing at least thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date of such change in ownership. Any prepaid contract payments unearned as a result of the change of ownership will be refunded by the Cooperator to the Department. The determination of the portion of unearned contract payments shall be based upon a proration of the contract period in effect prior to the change of ownership.
- 8. This Contract can be terminated at any time by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice. If this Contract is terminated for any reason, any prepaid contract payments deemed by the Department as unearned as a result of a termination will be refunded by the Cooperator to the Department. The determination of the portion of unearned contract payments shall be based upon a proration of the contract period in effect prior to the effective date of such termination.
- 9. This Contract may be amended at anytime upon written agreement by the Cooperator and the Department.
- 10. Failure of the Cooperator to comply with these Contract terms may, at the Department's election, be cause for Contract termination; such termination shall be in accordance with the notice and provation provisions of Paragraph 8 above.
- 11. The Cooperator attests by signature below that said Cooperator holds the right to grant access to the above shown land for the purpose of allowing public fishing.
- 12. The Cooperator understands the land will be periodically inspected by Department personnel for the purposes of monitoring anglers' conduct and to otherwise enforce all applicable laws of the state (for this latter purpose the Contracted area shall be deemed to be Department controlled land).
- 13. This writing and its attachments shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties. This Contract shall not be binding upon the Department until executed by the Assistant Secretary for Operations of the Department. The execution by the District Fisheries Biologist is intended to establish the local contact, who procured this Contract, and to whom questions or concerns or any other notices provided hereunder should be directed.
- 14. This Contract intended to be a license to give access to the Department and public and shall not be deemed a lease or any other instrument that would grant the Department a real property interest in, or title to, the Cooperator's property. 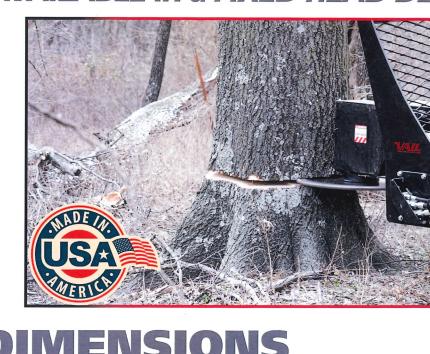
